Planned Parenthood – Challenges for Women at the Federal, State, and Local Levels

Planned Parenthood is a trusted health care provider, an informed educator, a passionate advocate, and a global partner helping similar organizations around the world. For nearly 100 years, Planned Parenthood has promoted a commonsense approach to women's health and well-being, based on respect for each individual's right to make informed, independent decisions about health, sex, and family planning.

The organization faces many challenges at the federal, state and local levels. There are many obstacles to the services provided, all of which have an impact on the education of women and of young women in particular.

President's Message



Our annual Holiday Party was a great success. I'd like to especially thank hostess Judith Olney and organizers Helle

Siegert and Joyce Scramaglia. Thank you to all who donated school supplies and to Shally Schultz for organizing our newest project, a holiday gift of a book to each first grader as part of our Reading Rocks tutoring program at Healdsburg Elementary School.

As we begin the New Year, our committees are gearing up for our major fundraiser and member activity, the Healdsburg Homes Tour under the leadership of Ronnie Devitt and Janet Hoehn. Last year we raised scholarships \$35,822 for our educational projects. This is our main mission, and we are very proud of what your efforts and support enable our branch to do. Here is how the Board has allocated the money, which is spent during the 2012-13 fiscal year:

Scholarships totaling \$17,500 for re-entry women completing two years at Santa Rosa Junior College and transferring to a four year college.

Healdsburg Educational Foundation (HEF) grant of \$10,000, which we chose to designate for the K-5 science enrichment program.

Tech Trek Science Camp \$900 tuition for seven girls (each year this depends on the success of our requests for Tech Trek grants during the year from businesses and other donors.)

AAUW Funds (national level fellowship grants) \$2000.

Holiday gift book for each first grader at Healdsburg Elementary, grant of \$250.

PSST Public School Success Team tutoring program, grant of \$1500 (many of our members are involved in this program in the Healdsburg schools.)

Supplies and expenses for our other community service projects.

Note that our entire fundraising goes to educational projects in keeping with our non-profit status. (Our social activities are always self-supporting.)

I hope each of you will find at least one way to be involved in the 2013 Healdsburg Homes Tour. It's a great way to get to know more members and to have fun in the process of supporting our mission.

What's new for Homes Tour this year?

We are trying to cut one of our biggest expenses, the printing and mailing of tour and raffle tickets. In an effort to reduce this expense, we are encouraging everyone who uses a computer to buy tour and raffle tickets online.

We are also experimenting with a postcard mailing in lieu of the more costly mailer. Around February 1 we will be sending out the postcard shown above to the *non-members* on our mailing list, encouraging them to buy tickets online and giving them a bonus raffle ticket as an incentive. We will also be giving an additional raffle ticket for the purchase of tickets prior to March 1. That way we will not have to send the big mailing in March for those who purchase during February.

Of course, we will give the same benefits to the most loyal HHT attendees and raffle ticket purchasers, our AAUW members. This is your advance notice. You will not be receiving a postcard, but we will send an email blast with instructions as soon as the Pay Pal online purchase option is activated. Ticket prices remain the same as last year.

Each year we request that every member either sell or purchase \$60 worth of raffle tickets. As you can see in Charlene's message (page 2) our AAUW branch makes a huge difference. Unlike other organizations, we are not constantly "nickel and diming you." Career Choices Program Benefits Local High School Students

When you were in high school did you know what you would be doing as a career for the rest of your life? Did you even know what you wanted to do? I suspect that the majority of us would answer in the negative.

To help today's youth tackle this issue, our AAUW chapter runs the Career Choices program at Healdsburg High School. Started five years ago by Dee McGuffey and Judy Edmonds, every year this program brings in people in the community in 10 different career fields to discuss various career possibilities within that field, talking about what education and skills are needed, potential earnings, and what it's like to work day-to-day.

We hope that after hearing from the panelists (3 to 4 panelists from each field), the kids will get a sense of what they might like to do in the future, and start making plans for needed courses and future education, whether it's for university and post-graduate work, for trade school, or for one of the many beneficial certification courses at the local junior college.

At this writing we don't have the final confirmation of the dates, but we can report the topics of this year's program. From January until April, 2013 we are holding career panels on: *Healthcare, Culinary Arts, Graphic Arts* (including CAD and web design), *Automobile Technology, Sales & Marketing, Public Safety, Information Technology, Engineering,*

Business Management, and Education. These topics are chosen based on the results of questionnaires asking what the students are interested in, plus the projections of availability, growth, and stability of those fields in the future. (Sorry, kids, we won't be telling you how to be a World-Series-winning baseball pitcher or a rock star — both of which were actually requested.)

Due to the popularity of Career Choices, we asked Healdsburg Rotary if they would like to partner with us, since both organizations promote education. They have been working with us since Year 2, and have been tremendous collaborators helping in the growth and esteem of the program.

Forty years ago I had the opportunity to spend a wonderful year in Durban, South Africa as an AFS exchange student. I lived with two host families and had an amazing school year at Mitchell Girls High, where I experienced the British school system, and grappled with the differences between Sonoma High and Mitchell. I drank in the wilderness on a week-long "Wilderness Leadership Course" at Umfolozi Game Reserve; did a two week mini-exchange to the country town of Ixopo (where Alan Paton wrote "Cry the Beloved Country"); and traveled all over what is now Kwazulu-Natal on our school's geography tour, seeing factories and people in addition to mountains and plains. What brings this to mind now is my recent trip back to Durban to attend a Mitchell High 40th class reunion. The first weekend I was there I visited with my host families, meeting children and grandchildren, and attended the reunion, reconnecting with 26 of my former classmates and five of teachers. My husband joined me the next week; we went off to see game in northern Zululand, then on to tour the Capetown area. It was a wonderful experience, and I was sad when it was time to leave the country and its people.

A Trip to Prague and Krakow

The Schindler Factory has been turned into a museum; viewing it brought tears to my eyes. I had very mixed emotions about going to Auschwitz, even though it has been a World Heritage Site since 1949. Auschwitz is a place; the Schindler Museum is an experience. I met delightful guides and tourists, and enjoyed good food and beer.
