


Susan Swartz is a California journalist, author and public radio commentator, living in Sebastopol. She's been writing about women since she reported on consciousness-raising groups and covered a rising star in the women's movement named Gloria Steinem. Living in the San Francisco Bay Area gives Susan a good place to report on outspoken women and boomer angst, which she did for twenty years in her awardwinning column for the Santa Rosa Press Democrat and the New York Times News Service.

Susan's book, *The Juicy Tomatoes Guide to Ripe Living after 50*, is based on interviews with midlife women around the country, women she calls "juicy tomatoes." She states, "They're not just any woman over fifty. They have daring and confidence and they can be wonderfully ironic about life because they've been around to see so much." A second book by Susan is *Goodbye Good Girl: Letting Go of the Rules and Taking Back Your Self* and *Claiming our Creative Self: True Stories from the Everyday Lives of Women.*

You can hear Ms. Swartz speak in her weekly public radio commentary on Fridays, "Another Voice," broadcast weekly on KRCB - FM, 91.1 and 90.9, the NPR affiliate in Sonoma County. It's Time to Renew Your AAUW Membership

Make life easier for your membership chair and treasurer by renewing before *June 15*. Tips:

- ✓ With the updated website, renewing online should be easier this year ... give it a try!
- ✓ The browser *Mozilla Firefox* seems to work faster than Internet Explorer on this website.
- ✓ You can find help with your member ID # and your password after you click Login.

There are two ways to renew your membership:

1) To renew online: Go to www.aauw.org, click LOGIN at the top of the page, and enter your MEMBER ID and PASSWORD (originally used for the Member Services Database (MSD)). When successfully logged in, the Login button now displays HELLO, and YOUR NAME. Scroll to the bottom of any page, click Member Tools, then click Member Services Database, then go to the column on the left and click on Renew My Membership to renew online, using your credit card.

While you're there, please review your contact details and note any changes.

Cast Your Ballot

As a member of AAUW, you have the privilege to vote for both our state and national officers and issues related to AAUW.

Voting for our state officers and policies started April 21 and will end May 11. We will elect our president-elect and our chief financial officer. We will also vote on public policy priorities for 2013-15, a proposal to increase state dues by \$4 effective 2014-15, and a proposal to amend the state bylaws to reduce the number of state directors from 16 to 12 effective 2013-14.

Each member in good standing, as of March 21, received an email message on Sunday, April 21, with a personal voting access code and election instructions. *We encourage all members to vote online*. Members who do not have an email address listed in the AAUW Membership Database or whose email is undeliverable, will receive a postcard in the mail. The email and postcard will have instructions for requesting a paper ballot, if it is necessary.

On the national level, all AAUW members are eligible to participate in the One Member, One Vote process to elect candidates for the AAUW Board of Directors and to vote on other items of business, including the proposed Public Policy Program and amendments to the AAUW Bylaws. Voting started April 15 and will end June 10.

You can find your voter PIN and member ID on the back cover of the current *Outlook* Magazine, the national AAUW magazine that came in the mail a couple of weeks ago. A reminder email, including online voting instructions, your own voter PIN, and member ID, was also sent April 8. If you can't locate your *Outlook* magazine, check your inbox for that email from Linda Hallman, AAUW Executive Director. You can find help with your member ID # and your password after you click *Login*.

AAUW California Annual Meeting 2013

On Saturday, April 20, I attended the first standalone AAUW California Annual Meeting in Sacramento. In the past our annual state meetings have been held in conjunction with the annual convention, alternating between northern and southern California. Last year it was decided to hold the state convention on alternate years, hence the need for a stand-alone meeting. The great thing about it was that it was held in the State Capitol building in the Senate chambers. Apparently it is highly unusual for outside groups to

use these facilities, so we were lucky to be there. Unfortunately we didn't quite make a quorum, so there was no voting, but no matter. We had a full morning of speeches from our National President, State President and other state officers and directors.

The benefit of attending the annual state meeting is

learning more about where our national and state dues go. At a national level, a large portion of our dues goes to the lobbying efforts of our organization for legislation such as the Family and Medical Leave Act, the Hate Crimes Prevention Act, and the Equal Pay Act. We also sponsor research such as Graduating to a Pay Gap: The Earnings of Women and Men One Year after College Graduation (2012) and Crossing the Line: Sexual Harassment at School (2011). The National organization hosts our MMP program, which processes our annual dues payments online. They also sponsor leadership programs for women and girls such as the National Conference for College Women Student Leaders. Last but not least, our national organization funded \$4.8M in fellowships and grants to 278 women this past year.

At the state level, we benefit more directly from the important programs sponsored by AAUW CA. The most visible (to our branch anyway) is Tech Trek, with ten camps on eight college campuses. At this point, we have sent over 9000 girls to Tech Trek since it started in 1998. In fact, the AAUW CA Tech Trek program has been so successful that five other states have now started Tech Trek programs at their colleges and universities. Our AAUW CA Tech Trek program is also considering a potential new program that would be open to Tech Trek

grads and focus specifically engineering. Other AAUW CA programs that our branch has not yet participated in (but that we may want to consider at some point) are Speech Trek, which is an annual speech competition for high school girls, Money Trek, which teaches girls basic money management skills, College/University Partners,

which focuses on developing relationships with girls on local college campuses.

And of course the topic of voting came up at the meeting. At the national level, online voting began on April 15 and includes candidates for AAUW President, Vice President, and Director. Since none of the candidates are from California, I'm not sure I have much basis for recommending any of them in particular. There is also the proposed 2013-15 AAUW Public Policy Program, which adds language programs for students with disabilities, access to healthcare, Medicare and Medicaid, immigrant and rights. promotion of STEM (science, technology, engineering and math) education. The national-proposed bylaws amendment is very minor. Voting closes on June 10, so please go to www.aauw.org and vote!
