President's Message



This has been another stellar year for our branch. Membership chair Gail Wright, buddy coordinator Judy Widlow, and member profiles writer Gloria Norton have welcomed 23 members,

bringing our total to 160. We will mourn the loss of members **Sally Lyle** and **Susan Armstrong**.

Our fundraising has been a great success and treasurer **Phil Wright** carefully monitored our budget. The 2013 Healdsburg Homes Tour featured a new logo, extended hours, and made more use of on-line resources. Increases in advertisers, sponsors, and raffle and ticket sales resulted in our highest gross ever! The proceeds will fund next year's scholarships and grants. Kudos and thanks to co-chairs **Ronnie Devitt** and **Janet Hoehn** and to the HHT committee (see pages 3-4) as well as to each of you who volunteered and supported the Tour.

The second year of our project to find corporate and private donors for Tech Trek raised the money to send seven girls this summer, (one more than last year), at the same time freeing up some money from the 2012 Homes Tour for scholarships and local grants. Thank You to **Sue Campbell** and the Tech Trek fundraising committee as well as to our member donors.

Scholarship board member Cathy Chiminello and the team chaired by Joyce Scramaglia, interviewed candidates and awarded five scholarships of \$2500 each to reentry women finishing at Santa Rosa Junior College and going on for BA degrees. Our branch has provided both financial support and service for local education. Our grants to the Healdsburg Educational Foundation funded the elementary science enrichment program and the afterschool library/computer program at the high school. Judy Edmonds chaired our continued partnership with Rotary to offer the Career Choices program, providing ten panel discussions for students. Our Reading Rocks volunteers, coordinated by Shally Schultz, worked one-on-one with first graders and provided each with a holiday book. Your holiday donations provided classroom

supplies for teachers. Pat Bertapelle and Nancy **Haiston** worked on the Expanding Your Horizons science exploration day, which our branch supported with volunteers and a small grant. Janice Sceales and her committee interviewed students and selected our seven junior high participants for the Tech Trek camp this summer at Stanford. Our GEMS (Girls Engaged in Math and Science) program supported past Tech Trek girls through field trips organized by Victoria Toboni and Hala Al-Shahwany. Cher Frechette filled our new board position as social activities coordinator, keeping members informed of our many events and ensuring access for our large membership. Dinners for 8, chaired by Helle Siegert and Joyce Scramaglia, Happy Hours arranged by Carol Novak, and Viv Furlong, our summer picnic organized by Mary Ann Gervais, and Friday lunches, now chaired by Barbara Gruber, kept us connected. Lida Simmons and Lee Kelley organized many interesting cultural outings. Thanks also go to the interest group coordinators for keeping all our activities going and for communicating with group members. Communications chair Liz Loebel kept us informed via our email system. Nancy Renkiewicz placed an article in the local press each month to increase community awareness of AAUW's activities and arranged for wonderful publicity for our Homes Tour. Nancy Haiston and Karen Fanucchi have kept our website current and Deana Fusco edited and formatted our newsletter. Carol McKnight and Kim Burmester lined up fine presenters for our Speaker Series, and Sue Campbell combined the roles of vice president and public policy chair, keeping us informed of the activities of state and national AAUW advocating for women. Thank you also to Board secretary Sandy Beddow and to the many others who took on special roles and committee work this year. I have been honored to serve as your president for two years and I know our branch will have an excellent leader in Sue Campbell as president next year. In an era when many organizations are struggling, our branch is thriving and can take pride in our accomplishments, thanks to the efforts of -Charlene Luks our members.

MOST SUCCESSFUL HOMES TOUR YET

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Every Healdsburg AAUW member can take pride in our group and the Healdsburg community. Collectively we put on a six-hour event that raised over \$46,000 for local education and scholarships for women and girls. There were 20 Homes Tour committee chairs and dozens of members of those committees working for months: finding seven homes; getting a record-setting \$20,000+ in sponsorships, advertisements, and donations; obtaining the gifts for six beautiful raffle baskets and selling raffle tickets; doggedly pursuing publicity opportunities; creating, printing, mailing and distributing postcards, posters, banners, signs, and the traditional mailings.

On the day of the event over 100 of our 160 members worked selling tickets, serving cookies, putting out and taking in signs and balloons. A cadre of their spouses put up and took down the set-up at the museum. The 70 docents particularly are to be commended for putting in three-hour shifts at the homes. (We promise to make this easier next year!) Thirty of you baked a mountain of cookies, all of which were consumed except for one platter which made it to the after-party.

You bought and sold tour and raffle tickets and half of you did so, as requested, in February so that we were able to greatly reduce the expensive mailings.

In spite of all of this effort, the Homes Tour could not have been a success without the generous contributions from the Healdsburg community. First, we must thank the owners and residents who opened their homes and got them "ready for company" of approximately 600 guests. Then we have to thank the generosity of the home sponsors, advertisers, raffle prize donors, the merchants who allowed us to display posters, postcards, and the banner. The Healdsburg Center for the Arts again allowed us to use its tables and chairs at the museum. The Healdsburg Museum deserves a special thanks for letting us use it, even on a day when it was closed, as our headquarters and its curator Holly Hoods needs to be thanked both for her write-ups of the homes in the program brochure and for promoting the tour in the museum's publications. We are also grateful to the wonderful publicity for the tour in the Healdsburg *Tribune* and the *Press Democrat* as well as to the online publications such as Patch and Healdsburg Education Foundation's website.

When you have the opportunity, please thank and patronize those who have helped us. And we thank each and every one of you for your contributions.

GEMS Tour Agilent Technologies

On May 9 the GEMS (Girls Engaged in Math and Science) group, accompanied by Victoria Toboni, Liz Loebel, and Hala Al-Shahwany, had an inspiring field trip to Agilent Technologies in Santa Rosa.

Elyse De Salvo, a senior electrical engineer who designs circuit boards at Agilent, led the girls (grades 7–9) throughout Agilent's large campus to show the process of making equipment that test frequencies in devices such as cell phones and radios. The

test
equipment
ensures that
the devices'
frequencies
are set
correctly and
will not
interfere with
other
surrounding
ones (such as
frequencies

in airplanes). De Salvo and her colleagues, who were all women scientists, managers, and engineers, demonstrated how Agilent produces most of the components that go into making the test equipment. The girls got to visit the machine shop where parts are made for research and development engineers to try various designs for their new products. They also got to see how the integrated circuits (computer chips) were manufactured on site. This was very impressive as most other companies outsource manufacturing components. The girls (and adults) jumped a little when going through the labs that conducted extensive functional, environmental, and shipping tests (loud

noise generated when products were dropped or shaken). The girls saw great examples of what a company would do to ensure that all of their products function and meet their own specifications as well as those required by United States and European standards.

The GEMS group was also impressed to see that Agilent sought clean energy through large solar panels installed in their parking lot structures. They also encouraged their

> employees to do little gardening if they wish and their have cafeteria chef growing vegetables and greens used in their meal preparation, good examples for



implementation of green strategies.

This tour exposed the GEMS group to how women role models can significantly contribute and be very successful, working and leading in various fields. —Hala Al-Shahwany

The Latest from Tech Trek



As we all know by now, Tech Trek is a series of science and technology camps held throughout California (and now several other states) to encourage incoming eighth grade girls in STEM courses. Our Healdsburg branch is well appreciated by the State Tech Trek committee as being extraordinary supporters of this outstanding program. While camps are held in several universities, our group attends Stanford every summer.

Last year **Tami Wiener-Stout, Sue Campbell** (both TT veterans), and **Judith Olney** served as dorm mothers for 70+ campers from Northern California (six coming from our branch). And we have generously given of our scholarship and special donor-directed funds to augment and enhance experiences for the students.

In April Judy Edmonds (the first dorm mother from Healdsburg) and Janice Sceales, (head of our TT selection committee) spoke to about 20 local Soroptimists at the Bean Affair to thank them for generously underwriting the expenses of one of the campers last summer, and to tell them more about this extraordinary program. The women enjoyed hearing the stories and showed a lot of interest. In fact afterwards, when Janice and Judy were in the parking lot, one woman came flying out saying that she wants to be a dorm mother herself! So, welcome new AAUW member and Tech Trek dorm mother Wendy Bertalon!

The Tech Trek committee has completed the selection of seven campers for the 2013 Marie Curie camp. Committee members, Janice Sceales, Beverly Liberman, Karen Fanucchi, and Amy Neel (see photo below) met with seventh grade math and science teachers from the middle schools in Cloverdale, Geyserville, Healdsburg, and Windsor, describing the program, the selection process, and suggesting who might benefit from camp. After that 19 candidates were nominated and 16 students returned their applications and essays. All



16 candidates were interviewed by members of the committee. It was difficult selecting only seven campers, but all 16 girls will be eligible for next year's GEMS* activities.

Tech Trek will be held this summer at Stanford University, July 7-13. You are encouraged to visit on Thursday, July 11 when Camp Curie holds its open house for AAUW members to experience this amazing program for yourself.

The 2013 campers are Natasha Marsden, Bailey Ray, Paloma Velasquez, Lauren Lazzarini, Morgan Vander Haar, Carolyn Boustany, and Samantha Santana. The new campers recently attended a party to meet each other and also meet former campers and those adults involved in the Tech Trek program.

It was a sad day for AAUW when Sally passed away on Tuesday, May 7. While the malignant tumor

on her liver may have been present for more than five years, it was only the last six weeks or so when the cancer affected her quality of life and even then she traveled to Arizona to visit one son and spent 12 days traveling in Europe with two other sons. She was amazing to the very end!

Sally came to Healdsburg more than 13 years ago and became involved with AAUW soon thereafter. From the time I first met her on an AAUW hike about six years ago, it became clear that AAUW was the foundation of her life in Healdsburg. Hiking, bridge, and a weekly game of dominoes with AAUW friends were a major part of her active life.

Sally's cookies and appetizers were a mainstay of AAUW meetings; she served on the Homes Tour committee for several years and baked cookies for this year's tour, led the Hiking Group for many years, edited the AAUW *Grapevine* for several years, was extremely active in the Monday Night Book Club, and most recently, she managed the AAUW's eScrip program. In addition, she served on the Friends of the Healdsburg Library board and dedicated hours to their book sales.

A Celebration of Sally's Life will be held on Saturday, June 1 at 3 p.m. at the Tayman Park Club House. Her four sons look forward to sharing memories with her many friends in Healdsburg; Tom from Des

Moines, Iowa; Bob from Phoenix, Arizona; John from Hawaii; and Doug from Moraga, California; and at least two of her grandsons will also be present. Please save the date for this wonderful celebration!
