President's Message

I hope by now all of you have received the



news of our recordbreaking Healdsburg Homes Tour. We sold close to 700 tour tickets and over 1,000 raffle tickets with net results of over \$43,000 which will be

going to HEF, SRJC, HHS, PSST, Tech Trek and others next year. Thanks to all our fabulous volunteers for making it such a successful Homes Tour!

I also wanted to report on the results of our voting this year. First of all, the State candidates all won (obviously - since they ran unopposed). But the bigger news is that the proposed State dues increase passed this year, which means our dues will go up by \$4 next year. On the local level, our slate of Board candidates was also approved (unanimously), as was our \$5 dues increase, which went into effect May 15, 2014. If you renewed your dues before then, they were \$85. If you waited until afterwards, they are now \$90. This dues increase will go towards increasing our social activities budget and funding badges for all new members going forward.

I have also been working on a pilot program for AAUW-CA by conducting a Title IX assessment at Healdsburg High School (HHS) along with Janice Sceales. We have met with the HR Director and Director of Student Services at HHS to discuss the school's sexual harassment and pregnancy policies, which are both part of Title IX. We also have plans to meet with the athletic directors to evaluate the locker rooms and sports fields for both boy and girl athletes as well as discuss the proportion of girls vs. boys participating in sports at HHS. The results of our review will be shared with HHS as well as

AAUW-CA and then reported out at an informational hearing at the State capitol in August. We already have made several recommendations, primarily concerning the information made available on their web site. Janice and I have also discussed potentially doing a similar review next fall at Windsor High School as well as Healdsburg Junior High School. If any members (or non-members, for that matter) are interested in joining us for those reviews, please let one of us know.

Last but not least, please join us for our annual Installation Luncheon on June 7 at the home of Lisa Grotts on Dry Creek. Not only will we be thanking our outgoing Board members and welcoming our new ones, we will have the opportunity to listen to Katie Barr of Tomorrow's Leaders Today, discussing a job-preparation program for high school juniors that we funded last fall. It should be an enjoyable afternoon for all. —Sue Campbell

Community Service

During the school year, each student is paired with a mentor who provides advice about college choices, keeps the student on track to meet deadlines, and assists with college applications and finding scholarship resources. Most importantly, mentors tell students, "I believe in you!"


VIPS

Gems Update

Did you happen to see the cover page article of the April issue of *The Atlantic* magazine titled *Closing* the Confidence Gap —Evidence shows that women are less self-assured than men—and that to



succeed, confidence matters as much as competence? Did this ring a bell? Our April speaker series presentation by Professor Paula Lane highlighted the same points around this issue. Well, our AAUW GEMS (Girls Engaged in Math & Science) program is set out to demonstrate that women in STEM fields are intelligent, creative, and can be just as successful and confident as their male colleagues. Our last field trip of the year,



touring a local company called Métier, was a great inspiration to our girls who came from various local schools, grades 7 through 12. Métier Co-Founder Sandra Richardson, their Chief Operating Officer Amy Vaccari, and other women in management and marketing positions greeted the girls and

talked about how they chose their education and career paths. With a solid academic background and determination to succeed, they have become part of a very successful consulting software business, which offers project management tools for other companies.

At one point the adults switched roles with the girls by pretending they were junior high school students and told the girls what their interests, activities, and class choices were at that age. The girls in turn had to pretend they were adults and talked about what careers they envisioned themselves doing 10 years from now.

Then the girls were split into two teams and were



tasked with two projects: one was how to plan a school trip to Europe and the other was how to plan a sport tournament at school. The girls learned about project management concepts, discussing goals, budget, resources, personnel, and scheduling.

Towards the end, an informal discussion took place where GEMS students were talking enthusiastically with Métier women panelists about how they could make career choices in this field that they've never heard of before. We were delighted to see their enthusiasm and grateful for the opportunity to experience a model that hopefully will spread and become the norm in our culture soon.


New Members
