Cervical Cancer, the HPV Virus, You, and the Rest of the World

Kay Taylor retired from her Kaiser practice in 2005 to found PINCC, a volunteer medical training NGO that establishes sustainable sites for cervical cancer prevention and treatment in developing countries. Although this disease is rare in the USA thanks to regular screening and treatment, it is the number one cancer-killer of women in the global south, killing 275,000 women every year.

The HPV virus has other effects too, and causes more cancer deaths among men in the USA than cervical cancer does among women. Learn more about this virus, its prevention and treatment, as well as PINCC's mission to save thousands of women from the most known preventable cancer by its work in Africa, India, and Latin America.



Community Service The Growing of a Program: CAREER CHOICES

Since its beginning in 2009 our *Career Choices* program has been steadily growing, helping students at Healdsburg High School in future career choices. AAUW first responded to a request from HHS when, due to 2008 budget cuts, their counseling staff was drastically reduced. **Judy Edmonds** and **Dee McGuffey** offered to help set up a program whereby students would be exposed to careers. **Todd** and **Leslie Evert** played a big part in its formation. Today Judy still coordinates the program.

Each year we provide a panel of experts in various fields such as engineering; culinary/hospitality; business; building trades; information technology/computers; etc. At each panel several interesting professionals come to talk to the students about educational requirements, salaries, and what to expect if they wish to pursue that line of work.

At the summer retreat president **Sue Campbell** asked all board members to present goals for the year. One of Judy's goals was to develop a student committee to committee to support CC. Senior Ethan Petereit (see photo) agreed to be the coordinator and has done an amazing job in recruiting others to take part. With this student involvement there is an energy that is infectious. The school has been so supportive of **Career Choices**, telling us this program is making a difference at the school. This year they asked if we

would provide 10 panels instead of the eight we've done in the past. (Of course we would!) And they moved the program to block days, so we would have two hours to present the speakers instead of only one 50-minute period. The photo below shows the October Healthcare/Medicine panel. Students who are interested in the subject sign up in advance. To make the setting more intimate and easier for students to ask questions, each speaker sits at a table surrounded by 8-10 students. After

10-15 minutes the students move to the next table so that everyone has a chance to interact with each of the speakers. This year we are averaging 60 students per panel!
