

OUR WORST PRESIDENTS: AN ANATOMY OF FAILURE

William Shakespeare might have said that some presidents are born failures, some achieve failure, and some have failure thrust upon them. Chris O'Sullivan will lead us on an irreverent journey through American history to explore what it takes to become one of our worst presidents. What role does personal and public character play? Are presidential actions primarily responsible for failure or is failure more a result of challenging times? Why do many of our presidential failures come in succession, such as in the 1850s, the 1920s, or the 1970s? What roles do changing perspectives and historical revisionism play in assessing presidential failure?

(BA UC Berkeley, PhD University of London) has taught American history for nearly two decades at USF where he is the recipient of the Innovations in Teaching Prize as well as the Distinguished Lecturer Award. He is also the



author of six books on American history including, most recently, Harry Hopkins.

American Politics in the Movies

As soon as Hollywood movies could talk, they talked about politics. Two polar opposite films of the 1930s are ideal examples: "Gabriel Over the White House" (1933) with a Mussolini-like President suspending the Constitution; and "Mr. Smith Goes to Washington" (1939) as a populist legislator rallying young people to reform the government. That may sound all too familiar, but it should not be surprising. The history of American cinema provides a prescient lens through which to view our evolving political challenges and dispositions. This course will analyze and sample a wide variety of movies about American politics from All the King's Men to All the President's Men, from Nixon, Milk, and Lincoln to Bulworth and Dave, from Advise and Consent to In the Loop, and many more.

Larry Eilenberg (PhD Theatre Arts, Yale University) is an expert in contemporary theatre and comedy. He has worked extensively throughout professional theatre and formerly served as Artistic Director at The Magic Theatre, a major theatrical company in San Francisco. He is a professor



at SF State University and has taught a number of summer courses for the CSU Summer Arts Program.
