President's Message

2018-19 has been another fun and productive year for our Branch. We accomplished one of our two major strategic goals and have done the ground work to complete the second goal next year. The new members who have joined our branch have stepped right up to participate in helping to do those things that fulfill our mission of "advancing equity for women and girls through research, education and advocacy." It was such a pleasure to go to the New Member Coffees and hear our newest members ask how they can get involved. In May we had another successful Homes Tour. A big thank you to Laura Tyler, her team and the many volunteers who made it happen.

By the time this year is over, we will have awarded over \$100,000 in scholarships to high school students and re-entry women, chosen and funded our Tech Trekkers, and given a \$10,000 community educational grant, among other things. And, in July we will give our first Al Garren renewal scholarship awards. How exciting is that!!!

Our Branch, standing at 213 members, continues to evolve. This year we re-assessed our leadership structure and took a look at how we distribute the money that is raised. Because of that assessment, a STEM Director was added to the Board, thus focusing the coordination of Tech Trek, GEMS and EYH activity. We also re-evaluated how we donate our money and confirmed that our priorities will continue to support educational efforts in the community from pre-school through high school.

This year's Board Directors have been busy and productive, as evidenced by their year-end reports detailing progress toward their goals, problems encountered, and ideas for the next year. That information was summarized in the 2018-19 Year in Review handed out at the Annual Meeting and is posted on the website. You will be impressed at what your Board has accomplished in the past year.

This is my last article as Branch President. It's been a great ride and I thank you for the opportunity to serve the branch in this capacity. I want to give a 'shout out' to the amazing women on my Board who have supported me these past 2 years. It was an honor to work with all of you. Being on the Board really keeps you "in the know". Carroll Estes To Be Honored with Robert M. Ball Award

Professor Emerita **Carroll Estes**, PhD, FAAN, and a Healdsburg AAUW member has been named a recipient of the 2019 Robert M. Ball Award for Outstanding Achievements in Social Insurance. In its announcement, the National Academy of Social Insurance wrote, "Estes is one of the foremost innovative thinkers and educators on the interaction of social insurance with gender, race/ ethnicity and class issues, and she has used this work to inform policymaking in the fields of health, aging and social insurance."

Estes founded and directed the Institute for Health and Aging from 1979 to 1998, and chaired the Department of Social and Behavioral Sciences from 1981 to 1992. In 2014, **Estes** received the University of California Medal, UCSF's highest recognition. She served as consultant to U.S. Commissioners of Social Security and to U.S. Senate and House Committees on Aging for three decades.

After graduating from Chico State, Joan and her husband moved around a bit, but landed in Santa Maria when her son was a toddler. Having been a gymnast in high school and college, Joan started teaching pre-schoolers gymnastics and quickly found herself Program Director. When the family moved to Healdsburg she continued coaching, first in Petaluma and eventually at her own studio in Windsor, where she continues to teach and run a business. In her early years, Joan enjoyed mentoring high risk teen age girls and is now an advocate in the Sonoma County Human Trafficking Task Force.

Rebecca West

Rebecca grew up in Mill Valley then spent much of her adult life in San Diego where she raised two daughters as a single mother. She worked as a nurse at Scripps hospital, working her way up to a nursing director role. When the hospital eliminated the director position, Rebecca took the opportunity to relocate north, first in San Francisco working at CPMC hospital, then, two years ago, she settled in Healdsburg and works part-time at Sutter Santa Rosa hospital. Although Rebecca left one daughter, son-in-law and grandchildren in San Diego, her older daughter and grandchildren live in Healdsburg.

Rebecca notes her education was fragmented. In her 20's, she received an associate degree as a licensed vocational nurse, then worked while going to school for her RN. In her 30's she received her bachelor's, and, when nearly 50, she obtained her master's degree. From this experience, she has compassion for women trying to finish their educations — especially while continuing to work and raise children.

In this way, joining AAUW not only offers Rebecca the opportunity to meet new people, join a book group and attend social events, but perhaps to lend support to women pursuing their education in a nontraditional way.
