Community VIPs (Volunteers In Partnership with Community)

A few years ago when AAUW wasn't well known in the community, our branch started a program to "introduce" the branch - even though we had been established in Healdsburg 30 years earlier! That outreach program, which included a program called Community VIPs, was so successful that in two years we more than doubled our number of members, and realized the program was no longer needed.

Today we have 200+ members, and many local leaders refer to AAUW as "a force in the community." Recently we realized that now we are receiving inquiries from other organizations asking if we can help them in various activities. So, the board decided to revive this program.

In short, when we receive a plea for help from another local non-profit organization for volunteers for an event, this request will be forwarded to the Community VIPs director (**Judy Edmonds**). She will decide if the request meets our guidelines; if so, she will send out an email blast inviting our members to sign up if they are interested.

In the future you may receive notification that another non-profit organization is seeking volunteers. This will be for a one-time occasion. If you are interested, feel free to sign up. But there is no pressure to do so. It's just another example of AAUW supporting the community.

GEMS (Girls Engaged in Math & Sciences)

In October GEMS (Girls Engaged in Math and Science) sponsored two programs for junior high and high school students.

Bodega Bay Marine Laboratory (BML)

On October 22 there was a field trip to the University of California's Bodega Marine Laboratory (BML) located in Bodega Bay. In attendance were 19 students from Cloverdale, Geyserville, Healdsburg and Windsor schools. AAUW chaperones included **Vicki Pearson**, **Martha Noble**, **Cathy Mock**, **Karla Rosen** and **Diane Bartleson**.

One of the highlights of the tour was a 24-foot-long display, containing many colorful local fishes and invertebrates, and a small kelp forest. Past that was a harbor aquarium, holding residents of the local estuary, and a subtidal habitat displaying anemones, etc. However, BML is not a museum or a zoo. It is a full-time research facility. Students had the opportunity to observe ongoing studies and learn how BML scientists do their research, including conservation programs and environmental challenges related to the northern California coastline. In addition, the students were given a special tour of BML's aquaculture operation.

Another highlight of the trip was a special presentation by Jackie Sones, Ph.D., about the focus of ongoing research on the impact to marine life by increased sea water temperatures. Dr. Sones has experience working in marine, estuarine, freshwater, and terrestrial systems with a diversity of plants and animals. She documents change in coastal ecosystems and recently co-authored a Scientific Reports article describing geographic range extensions of marine species in northern California. Her work also includes education and public outreach.

Professional Women's Career Panel

The second October GEMS event was a Professional Women's Panel held at the Healdsburg Library. The Panel was focused on careers in STEM with seven dynamic women sharing their education and career journeys, including:

- **Sophie Fletcher**, BS Anthropology, MD Urology, Asst Urology Professor, Co-Director of Sutter Pelvic Health & Incontinence Center in Santa Rosa
- Elsa Frick, BS, MS Bioengineering. Environmental Health Specialist, Onsite waste-water consultant
- Mahek Laxmipriya, BS, MS Biomedical Engineering, Regulatory Affairs Professional at Medtronic
- **Martha Noble**, BS, Graduate Student Biological Sciences, JD. Environmental Law, Professor, Agricultural and Environmental Law, Member US EPA

2019 SRJC Scholarships for Re-entry Women: “Our efforts are making a difference.”

As a part of our Healdsburg AAUW branch’s mission of encouraging higher education for women, this year we awarded scholarships to eight highly deserving, re-entry women who graduated from Santa Rosa Junior College and are now pursuing their degrees at a four-year college/university. These awards bring the total amount in scholarships to SRJC students to nearly \$255,000 since 1995. Applicants were carefully screened and interviewed by our scholarship committee that included Cindy Brenton, Mickey Sarquis, Phil Wright and myself.

Besides the academic rigor of taking college classes, this year’s awardees have had to overcome a host of significant barriers that cause many others to rethink their need for a college degree, lower their career goals, or walk away from college never to return. Not so with this year’s scholarship recipients! While they all at one point were forced to step back from school, each rallied in her own way, worked through and overcame the challenges that confronted them, returned to and graduated from SRJC, and are now pursuing degrees at a 4-year college/university. What did this year’s candidates face that forced them to drop out of school in the first place?

- * Having to support her parents by making mortgage payments and putting food on the table
- * Overcoming a childhood with parents addicted to drugs
- * Getting trapped into human trafficking and abusive relationships
- * Living in poverty as a child
- * Being stabbed by a mentally ill family member
- * Having cancer
- * Struggling with mental health issues

The stories of their challenges are heartbreaking. But despite all that confronted these women, our recipients were winners! They DID return and graduated with highest honors from the SRJC. The selflessness and dedication to their communities is also worth noting. Each in her own way not only worked to better her own life, but also worked to make a difference in the lives of others. 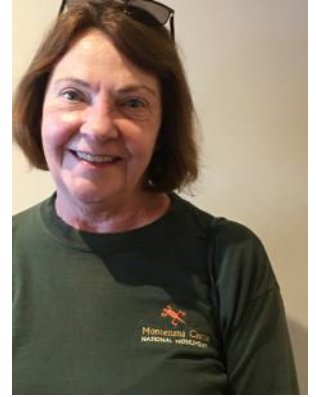
MEMBERSHIP – MEET OUR NEW MEMBERS
