2020 SRJC Scholarships for Re-entry Women

Our efforts are making a difference

As a part of our Healdsburg AAUW branch's mission of encouraging higher education for women, this year we awarded scholarships to six highly deserving re-entry women who graduated from Santa Rosa Junior College and are now pursuing their degrees at a four-year college/university. These awards bring the total amount in scholarships to SRJC students to nearly \$279,000 since 1995. Applicants were carefully screened via a new online system that worked perfectly during the pandemic. Our scholarship committee included **Cindy Brenton, Maureen Keefe, Rebecca West, Phil Wright** and myself.

Besides the academic rigor of taking college classes, this year's awardees have had to overcome a host of significant barriers that cause many others to rethink their need for a college degree, lower their career goals, or walk away from college never to return. Not so with this year's scholarship recipients! While they all, at one point, were forced to step back from school, each rallied in her own way, worked through and overcame the challenges that confronted them, returned to and graduated from SRJC, and are now pursuing their degrees at a 4-year college/university. What did this year's candidates face that forced them to drop out of school in the first place?

- •Struggling with mental health issues
- •Life changing physical injury and raising 4 children
- •Addiction, homelessness and incarceration
- •Teen mom, high school dropout and vision disability
- •Financial instability and family matters



Despite all that confronted these women, our recipients are winners! They DID return and graduated with highest honors from the SRJC. Each, in their own way, not only worked to better her life, but also worked to make a difference in the lives of others and their communities. In the introductions, she proclaimed, "Learning science is fun!" and when asked, "what one word describes what you love about science?", she told the girls "DISCOVERY." Karla encouraged the campers to take a multidisciplinary approach to their education to better prepare for the growing inter-connectedness of people and technologies. These ideas became foundational to the experiences shared with the girls throughout the camp.

Recognizing the importance of building on the Tech Trek experience, Karla recently introduced <u>Tech Trek Alumni Group (TTAG</u>) to bolster these exceptional girls' interest in STEM through high school and beyond. With the encouragement of AAUW advisors, these Tech Trek Alumnae will develop leadership skills and enjoy social interaction with like-minded girls who have similar ambitions and goals.

Karla grew up in Elkhart, Indiana, started college at Tulane, transferred to the University of Colorado where she graduated with a double major in psychology and computer science, and later received her master's degree in business from Carnegie Mellon. After a notable career in product planning with HP, she retired to Sonoma county, eventually settling in Healdsburg. Fun facts: she has an incredible eye for local art and design; is a connoisseur of espresso coffee; and loves exploring and experiencing the world and humanity.
