Robert Rubin takes us Underwater

The California Current is one of only four highly diverse, life-filled current systems in the world's oceans. As Professor Rubin dives deep into his subject, he will show us stunning original videos that will inspire us to help preserve this natural wonderland.

Dr. Rubin is the founder and director of the Pacific Manta Research Group. Recent work by Dr. Rubin and his colleagues in subtropical Pacific significantly contributed to the UNESCO establishment of the Revillagigedo Archipelago of Mexico as a World Heritage Site. Their efforts also include establishment of educational programs about protection and conservation of marine organisms in colleges and universities in Mexico and the USA. Dr. Rubin has been selected by the State of California Legislature and the United States Congress to receive their awards for outstanding contributions to college and university teaching. Pete Elman Returns!

The dynamic Pete Elman is back to give us a fascinating course about American Folk music, which he calls the "soundtrack" of the period 1950-1975. Pete examines how folk music became integrated into the larger world of politics and popular music. The legendary musicians he will cover include:

Week One: the early days: sowing the seeds of protest in a tuneful way; John Lomax, Leadbelly, Carter Family, Woody Guthrie, Almanac singers, Pete Seeger, Josh White, Weavers, New Lost City Ramblers, Odetta, and Harry Belafonte.

Week Two: **1961-65** The Bard arrives from the North Country and takes New York by storm; the first couple of folk music: Bob Dylan and Joan Baez.

Week Three: NYC in the early 1960's; Greenwich Village, the folk magazines: *Broadside* and *Sing Out,* Folkways records, Vanguard Records, Jac Holzman and Elektra records, Dave Van Ronk, Ramblin' Jack Elliott, Tom Paxton, Phil Ochs, Tom Rush, Richard and Mimi Farina, Cisco Houston, Doc Watson, Judy Collins.

Week Four: Folk groups who made the music accessible: Kingston Trio, Peter, Paul and Mary, Highwaymen, Limeliters, Brothers Four, New Christy Minstrels.

Week Five: Gone but not forgotten; late singers who pushed the boundaries of folk music: Richie Havens, Fred Neil, Tim Hardin, Tim Buckley, John Stewart, Steve Goodman (not gone!), and a tribute to John Prine.

Week Six: The Canadian connection: Buffy St. Marie, Ian and Sylvia, Gordon Lightfoot, Joni Mitchell, Leonard Cohen, Jesse Winchester.

Presentations were given at dozens of schools, students participated in a "Real Woman" essay contest (wouldn't you love to read some of those essays?!), and a parade was held in downtown Santa Rosa. This local inspiration spread to communities across the country. In 1980, President Carter declared March 8 National Women's History Week, and by 1987, Congress voted to expand the event to the entire month. Lunch Bunch is Back!!

With the Covid numbers waning, we are back arranging Lunch Bunch events. Hopefully, virus numbers will stay low and this virus will finally disappear. If you're anything like Cecile and me, we are excited to see everyone.

We've been busy checking out restaurants the last six months, but the reality has been most restaurants have had challenges serving the general public, let alone hosting one of our lunch outings. Challenges have included available outside space, staffing, and food supplies. We have all heard and seen that costs have gone up, so we probably will not be able to arrange lunch for our previous \$30. We will try to keep lunches in the \$35 - \$40 range, including tax & tip. In an attempt to make these lunches fun and affordable, we have had to skip a few of our favorite restaurants. We will be scouting around and arranging additional Lunch Bunch events, focusing on outside seating. We will be looking south all the way to Santa Rosa for new options.

Refunds are difficult and should not be expected. We work with each location to negotiate the menu, price and the anticipated number of attendees. We commit to the restaurant generally a week in advance based on the number of checks we have received. Once we commit, as a rule, we cannot accept any more attendees or provide refunds. We try our best, but there is no guarantee past the commitment date.

To kick off our 2022 Lunch Bunch program, we are returning to **Simi Winery** in Healdsburg. Forty of us enjoyed a wonderful farm-to-table experience in January, 2020, right before the shutdown.

If you haven't been to <u>Simi</u>, it's a gem nestled in the redwoods. In addition to their tasting room that hosts their fabulous wines, Simi has two chefs who create their own recipes from scratch for events and catering. One of these chefs will be creating our surprise lunch menu just for us!

Reading Rocks



Reading Rocks is our **AAUW** program that pairs **AAUW** members with a teacher to assist learning to read and beginning to read students, as they practice their reading skills. Most **Reading Rocks** volunteers read one-on-one with the students 1-2 days a week for 60-90 minutes. Healdsburg Elementary and West Side School are the two schools that participate in our program; **Diane Burnley** and **Pat Bertapelle**, are the co-coordinators. Due to COVID we have been unable to meet with students these past two years.

Each year to encourage and support students as they learn to read, our **AAUW Reading Rocks** program gives books to each first grade student. In addition, each first grade teacher receives a few books to use in lessons and add to the classroom library. This year the books were given to each teacher in mid-January. (This is one month later than our usual gifting time due to delays in the shipping of the books we ordered.) Each school's staff expressed their appreciation for our generosity.

Taylor Fatherree's Story

2016 recipient of the AAUW Healdsburg Branch SRJC Scholarship

I am so grateful for the Healdsburg AAUW's support when I was finishing at Santa Rosa Junior College (SRJC) in 2016. It helped me build on my academic and ultimate professional career. I had gone back to school after a significant absence, and this was one of the first scholarships I received. It helped me study abroad that summer in Jordan, and then earn my BA in Peace and Conflict at UC Berkeley in Spring 2018.

After undergrad, I taught English in Bogotá, Colombia for eight months on a Fulbright grant, and then I enrolled in law school at the University of Virginia. Back at SRJC, I had wanted to use my education to serve others and work for justice, but I hadn't completely settled on how. By my first year of law school, I was dedicated to reforming our criminal legal system and working for those affected by it. Today, with one semester left in law school, I'm extremely excited to start my career as a public defender.

I'm currently working for the Charlottesville Public Defender's Office, and interned last summer with the Public Defender Service for D.C. In law school, I've participated in the Federal Sentencing Reduction Clinic, Criminal Defense Clinic, and Holistic Juvenile Defense Clinic.

When I received your Healdsburg AAUW scholarship back in 2016, I was just getting started on my education and becoming useful to others. I would not have been able to support myself during these opportunities without this type of support, and I promise to pay it forward. Now, after years of school and many jobs and internships, I am getting ready to move to the D.C. area with my partner and become a public defender. Thank you so much for helping me get here. I'll do everything I can to help my clients and pass along all that I've been given.
