Candidates' Forum


The Healdsburg Chapter of the American Association of University Women is co-hosting a Candidate Forum/Town Hall with The Raven Theater on October 6, starting at 6:30 pm. Seven candidates running for Healdsburg City Council will be there to answer your questions. The Raven still checks that attendees have been vaccinated. Masks are optional.

AAUW has hosted these events in past elections especially when the League of Women Voters did not. We have been notified that the League will not be hosting a forum in Healdsburg and feel that this is an important opportunity to assist the voters in getting to know the candidates. Timing the event was tricky, as the candidates' campaign managers asked that it be held the week that mail-in ballots go out and this was the date that the Raven had available that week. We do not endorse candidates and are committed to impartiality.

We will be using Corazon Healdsburg's Spanish translation headsets and provide real-time translation to anyone who attends and needs this assistance.

Title IX: Still More to Do



I benefited tremendously from Title IX but didn't realize this at the time. I graduated high school in 1973, having rowed crew at the national level. I crose to attend UC Berkeley in part because I had learned that they had an emerging women's Rowing program. By 1974-75 all women's sports at CAL seemed to have all kinds of new resources thrown at them; our weight room moved from a dark, cramped storage space in the gym basement to a large, bright room with high ceilings on the main floor; our few machines that had been discarded by the men's team had been traded in for all kinds of fancy new equipment. Instead of one part-time coach we had two coaches who were dedicated to women's crew. Also, our travel schedule expanded to include East Coast travel, as well as even international regattas. No one explained to us why these changes were going on. Naively, we thought that out of the goodness of their hearts, the

university had realized that women's sports deserved the same resources as men's. Even at that age we understood the realities that something like men's football generates revenue in a way that no women's sport does. But at the same time, Men's crew is very much like Women's crew, in that neither generates any revenue, so it only seemed fair to us that our program was looking much more like that of the men. A few years later when I was at graduate school at Harvard and had access to their Women's Boathouse, I was equally impressed with the transformation that was going on there. The full impact of this hit me when our oldest daughter was on the Women's Freshman Rowing team at Harvard and I saw what parity had been created between Men and Women's sports programs. Other people have written better than I can about the benefits to women of having participated in organized sports, but just being able to understand all the sports analogies that go on in business meetings was a big plus for me. So yes, even though I didn't credit it at the time, I certainly realize now the tremendous positive impact of Title IX.

<u>Membership</u>

A reminder that it's not all about fires

The following is largely borrowed from a post sent out by the Mill Creek COPE group.

The September 13, 6:39pm jolt centered just north of Santa Rosa along the Rodgers Fault (which runs through Healdsburg) is a good reminder for us all that we need to be prepared for a big earthquake. We got the automatic WEA-type (LOUD!) alert thanks to having the <u>MyShake</u> app on our phones. If you don't have that app, you might have found yourself looking at whoever was under the table with you, saying: Wasn't that an earthquake?

There is a ~95% chance of "*The Big One*" (6.7 or higher) hitting Northern California in our lifetimes, so it makes sense to prepare for the possibility.

There are some major differences to be aware of as to how wildfires and earthquakes might impact our rural community:

- **During a wildfire evacuation order**, Sheriff's Department personnel will try to visit each home to ensure all are notified and evacuated.
- In the aftermath of a major earthquake, however, there will not be any advance warning, and first responders could likely be overwhelmed responding to emergencies over a very wide area. It is possible that outlying areas like Fitch Mountain may not see any first responders for first-aid or fire-fighting for some time, possibly days, due to the widespread damage to roads, bridges, buildings, gas lines, water lines, power lines and communications in the more heavily populated urban areas. It is therefore more important than ever for rural residents to prepare for an earthquake now. And check in on your neighbors after a quake (if it's safe to do so) to ensure that no one is trapped, hurt or trying to deal with ruptured gas lines or fires, or lacking access to water for drinking or firefighting.

AAUW AI Garren Renewal Scholarship Awards

Five Sonoma County women, planning to graduate this academic year with degrees in English, Education, Finance, Criminology, and Business Administration, are the recipients of our 2022 Al Garren Renewal Scholarships in the amount of \$4,000 each. The awardees are **Barbara Beatie**, Lisa Bordessa, Bethany Flint, Allie Marriott, and Ivonne Moreno.

Our Al Garren Renewal Scholarships are intended to help previous recipients of our Santa Rosa Junior College (SRJC) Reentry awards complete their degrees. They were made possible by the 2018 receipt of a \$250,000 donor-directed grant from the San Francisco Foundation's Al Garren Fund. The late Alper A. Garren was a brilliant, compassionate and widelyloved Northern California particle physicist who gave generously of his time and resources to provide educational opportunities to promising students. With this year's five new grants, we will have helped twenty local women attain their educational goals!

Our recipients have overcome many challenges, often being the first in their families to attend college. Their studies and lives continued to be greatly affected by the pandemic. Many classes were on-line and some students struggled with feelings of isolation and felt they had missed out on the social aspects of university life. Our recipients had to learn how to balance the demands of school and work, and some also have young children at home needing care.

Even with all the obstacles presented by the pandemic and the demands of being full-time students, our awardees are leaders in their communities, always willing to help others. **Barbara Beatie**, whose goal is to be a community college instructor, was selected as a writing and math tutor at Sonoma State and will also be a first-year composition instructor this academic year. **Lisa Bordessa**, who plans on becoming a teacher and school counselor, was chosen as one of 27 students in Sonoma State's McNairs Scholar program which helps undergraduates publish their own research projects. **Bethany Flint** has already begun to apply her finance major to real world business scenarios, and participated in Sonoma State's student managed investment fund. **Allie Marriott** is majoring in criminology with a minor in counseling, and plans on a career as a juvenile probation officer. **Ivonne Moreno** wants to get her degree in business administration and help the immigrant community.

Speaking on behalf of our committee, one of the bright spots of this year was to be able to award scholarships to such deserving women. Supporting women like these women who seek to improve their lives and careers through education is what we stand for as AAUW members. We are sure our awardees will enrich the lives of all they encounter as they move forward in their careers.

Our Scholarship Committee includes **Cathy Chiminello**, **Sue Finan**, **Charlene Luks**, **Phil Wright** and myself. I thank them for their good service to our organization and to the women whose lives and futures we seek to improve.

Lori-Louise Hubbard's Story 2010 recipient of the AAUW Healdsburg Branch SRJC Scholarship

What Happened Next!

Quite some years back, you wonderful women of the AAUW gave me a scholarship while I was at SRJC. This is to let you know how things have been since you helped kickstart me into this life I love.

I'm Lori-Louise (was Lawrence, now Hubbard), and I was a re-entry student at SRJC at the age of 49, studying science in order to transfer into the Occupational Therapy (OT) program at Dominican University of California in San Rafael. I still remember standing in my kitchen reading your award letter and starting to weep because I was so moved by your belief in me. I thank you again, after all these years, for your generosity and kindness.

I spent five semesters doing math and science at SRJC. Entry to the OT program requires biology, anatomy, physiology, chemistry, and physics, so my brain was full! I transferred as a junior to Dominican and completed their combined Bachelors/Masters program to get a B.S in Health Sciences and an M.S. in Occupational Therapy. I'm proud that both of my degrees are science degrees, because after all my years as a "word" person, I'm thrilled to learn that I'm also good at the hard sciences!

My plan was to go into pediatric OT, specifically to work with children with autism. That is a fascinating specialty, but as a result, there's not much job turnover in that field, so I went into Adult Rehab "in the meantime," and promptly fell in love with it. I have LOVED being an occupational therapist, and also became a rehab director in skilled nursing in a small enough facility that being the director was not only meetings and administration, but also included a great deal of direct patient care. During that time, I also accepted many pre-OT, OT, and OT assistant students, so I was able to pass on the things I'd learned in a real-life setting.

Six years ago, I moved up to the northwest corner of Washington, right on the coast about 20 minutes from the Canadian border, and immediately applied for a Washington State OT license. Up here has been a wonderful place to practice OT, and I stayed in the skilled nursing environment. About six months before covid hit, I stopped being an occupational therapist and transferred those skills into doing home care, specializing in end-of-life care. Since many of my clients have some degree of cognitive decline, it's easier to remember things that relate to childhood, so my business name is right out of a nursery rhyme: Old Mother Hubbard In-Home Care.

I've taken the gift you gave me and gone out into the world, helping heal the world one life at a time. Thank you for your early support and encouragement. I appreciate you so much.
