Anastasia Edel Russia's War on Ukraine Thursdays 10-11:45 am, Feb 2 to – March 9, 2023 A live on-line class, recorded for later viewing

Two days before the Ukrainian invasion began, Anastasia wrote this in the NY Times:

"Ukrainians, who sacrificed millions of lives to save the Soviet Union from the Nazis, are masters of partisan resistance. The conflict would be protracted, the victory Pyrrhic and the consequences for Russia as a nation disastrous."

She will tell us why Russia become an aggressor and why Ukraine's rebirth is matched by Russia's civilizational and moral collapse, and how Anastasia believes this will all end for Russia, Ukraine, and the world. Anastasia will address the "dark side" of Russian culture (chauvinism, cruelty, conformism) and masks, and she justifies the suffering in Ukraine. As she discusses works of Russian art that present this "dark side, Ms. Edel will consider whether they still belong in the world's cultural cannon. The origins of Russian fascism will also be explored. Movie clips, music, art, and literature will be used to illustrate the latest political, economic and cultural events.

The recorded videos of the class will be available on line through April 30th. We hope to return to in-person classes sometime next year. STATE NEWS

The State Board is looking for new members. To nominate someone, apply for a position yourself, or just to find out more about it, click here. The positions they are looking for are:

- President-Elect (three-year term 2023-2026)
- · CFO (two-year term 2023-2025)
- Four Directors (two-year term 2023-2025)

November 8th was a good day for women! The election is finally over. AAUW members can be happy with the results. Here are a few highlights:

- One woman was added to each house of Congress: the U.S. House of Representatives and the U.S. Senate, bringing the numbers to 124 (H) and 25 (S).
- · Of the total of 149 women, 54 are women of color.
- With Nancy Pelosi stepping down as Speaker of the House, we lost the most powerful woman's voice in government, but still have a woman on the minority leadership team, Minority Whip Katherine Clark.
- · Governors of 12 states are now women.
- · 23% of all mayors across the nation are women, including our brand new and first woman mayor of Los Angeles, Karen Bass.
- 32 women won seats in the California Legislature (total confirmed 44, 3 pending)
- · All executive positions in California except Governor are filled by women, including Secretary of State, Lieutenant Governor, Treasurer, and Controller.
- Proposition 1 prevailed and a woman's right to control her own reproductive choices is now enshrined in our constitution.

Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion

One idea the State Board suggested was to schedule a lunch at a local ethnic restaurant and invite the owner to educate the attendees about their culture. I think that sounds fun!

Reading Rocks



Reading Rocks is our AAUW program that pairs AAUW members with a teacher to assist first and second grade students with their reading skills. Most Reading Rocks volunteers read one-to-one with the students one to two days a week for 60-90 minutes. Healdsburg Elementary and Westside School are the two schools that participate in our program; **Diane Burnley** and **Pat Bertapelle** are the co-coordinators.

Each year, to encourage and support students as they learn to read, our AAUW Reading Rocks Program gives a book to each first grade student. In addition, each first grade teacher receives a few books to use with lessons and to add the classroom library. 



Scholarship Success Story

Isabel Nunez Perez's Story

2017 recipient of an AAUW Healdsburg Branch High School Scholarship



I grew up in Alexander Valley outside of Healdsburg on a vineyard with my family. My parents still live and work there; my father has been working that land for almost 35 years. In 2017 I graduated from Healdsburg High School which is when I received your Healdsburg AAUW \$5,000 scholarship which allowed me to focus on academics freshmen year without worrying about finances.

This scholarship also gave me the confidence to push forward as I challenged myself academically and re-located to Oregon. Going to university out-of-state was one of my biggest goals at the time. I remember feeling on top of the world when my name was announced as the recipient of one of the largest single scholarships awarded that night. I was in complete shock and so were some of my peers. No one who applied for this scholarship was aware of the potential \$5,000; applicants were only informed of a fraction of that amount. It was a very validating experience, as at that time I was pursuing Engineering, knowing that very few women and even fewer Latinas were in that field. It made me feel seen and that others also believed in this message of supporting young people, especially first generation-students, children of immigrants.

My transition to college was very rough. I still find it difficult to reflect on my first year and the unprecedented challenges that I had moving to Oregon. The diversity, comfort, and language of California was a security that I didn't realize I had until I left. I

describe this transition as a deafening silence that enclosed me and threatened to suffocate me; not hearing spoken Spanish, not being able to see myself in a stranger's face and, at some point in my time in Oregon, I also developed a mortal fear for my life.

There have been many Healdsburg grads before me who attended Oregon State that wouldn't have faced these challenges because they did not look like me or move through the world as me. What grounded me was an incredible community of women and femmes of color that I found when taking my first Spanish class. I began to develop more confidence in myself, feel secure in my decision making and speaking up for what is right. Through developing a close-knit network of peers, we were able to fight, organize and build our way through shared experiences of discrimination at its many intersections.

In my second year, I switched to Political Science, as my community has always been affected by unjust systems of government and understanding these systems has also been a lifelong passion of mine. I then learned how to navigate legislative spaces, advocate, and lobby at the state capitol in Salem, as well as develop my organizing skills. My friends then gave me the courage to run for student body president. My VP and I were the first dual Latina ticket to run and be elected. This opportunity did not come without its own set of challenges, of course, but it was an amazing experience. * I graduated from Oregon State University in June 2021 with a bachelor's in Political Science, option in Law and Politics, and a minor in Spanish.

Leading up to graduation I knew I had to come back to California to heal; so, I've relocated to Oakland to work with youth on probation. I support them in their personal goals, advocate for them, and help them and their families navigate the systems. I have found that I really enjoy working with teenagers. Your scholarship gave me courage to fight for myself and others and to show the youth and families that I now work with that despite their circumstances, someone believes in them too.
