High School Scholarships

At the end of the 2023 school year our branch was able to give up to \$6,000 in scholarships to twelve amazing young women, thanks to your generosity and our partnership with the JNR Foundation. We had many applicants from Healdsburg, Windsor, Cloverdale and Geyserville to choose from. After a great deal of deliberation, we chose twelve which we handed out at each school's award night. The students are going to a



variety of universities, including UCLA, UC Berkeley, Sonoma State, Sacramento State, UC Davis, and the University of York in England. Majors include molecular and medical microbiology, kinesiology, health science, environmental studies and theater arts, just to name a few. Some of the recipients plan to become physicians, physician assistants, physical therapists, and psychologists. Many of them are first generation college students wanting to give back to their community. Similar to last year, a few of the girls were former Tech Trek graduates! I received several heartfelt thank you notes this summer, such as this one from a student who received a Tech Trek Scholarship while she was in middle school as well as a college scholarship from AAUW and the Saralee Kundee RNR Foundation. I will include other thank you notes in future Grapevine issues. As an AAUW branch, we really do change lives! Your generosity and commitment will help us continue to do so in the future.

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Advancing Gender Equity is Advancing Environmental Sustainability (and vice versa)

After a year of wild weather in California, many of us may be thinking more about climate, environment, and sustainability. How does our concern with the weather relate to AAUW California's Public Policy Priorities? Advancing gender equity is directly related to environmental sustainability. The inverse is also true.

<u>The United Nations sustainable development goals</u>, adopted in 2015, seek to push all countries to act to protect the planet, ensure widespread prosperity, and promote peace. Achieving gender equality, goal number five, is a crucial element in this overall strategy.

We know that having greater gender diversity in leadership improves organizations. One of AAUW California's public policy focus areas is increasing women in leadership positions. However, advancing this goal can also have positive climate impacts. The UN has found that having greater gender diversity in climate discussions leads to improved outcomes on climate-focused policies and projects. This is just one case in which we can see how sustainable development goal 5, promoting greater gender equality, alongside advancing AAUW California's public policy priorities, can be important for achieving sustainable development goal 13, creating more impactful climate action.



Data also shows us that (un)sustainable production and consumption patterns, which harm the environment, <u>tend to be gendered</u>, with "green" choices being widely feminized. While this is a global trend, we see this in popular portrayals of more planet-friendly consumption choices in the United States, as well, such as veganism, <u>which tends to be marked as more "feminine"</u> and less "masculine." This example shows us that sustainable development goal 5, promoting greater gender equality, alongside AAUW California's overall public policy mission of advancing equity for women and girls, is also important for achieving sustainable development goal 12, which focuses on creating more planet-friendly and responsible production and consumption patterns.




AAUW in Tracy CA was a great place to meet people, learn about her new town and contribute to the community. Her
