Lobby Days 2024 - Save the Date!

Mark your calendars! AAUW California will hold our 2024 Lobby Days event on April 2 and 3, 2024. An interest survey including a registration form will arrive in your inbox mid-January. Please be sure to complete and return the form to be added to the communications list for the event.

We encourage all AAUW California members to participate in this act of advocacy that is essential for achievement of our legislative priorities. In addition to our members, we plan to invite college students to join the event. Their participation will enable us to reach more legislative offices, and we hope that this introduction to our organization will inspire these advocacy-minded young people who share our values to join AAUW.

Starting in January, our committee will evaluate new bills introduced in the state legislature which are aligned with our Public Policy Priorities: Economic Security for All Women, Equal Access to Quality Public Education for All Students, Social and Racial Justice for All Members of Society, and Increased Representation of Women in Leadership Roles. In early March, our committee will meet to discuss our evaluations and select 30-35 bills for our 2024 Legislative Agenda that best represent our priorities. We will also choose the top 3 bills to advocate for during Lobby Days.

Lobby Days 2024 is scheduled to take place when the legislature returns to session after their Easter break, and will span two days to provide flexibility so that we can secure as many meetings as possible. We are planning a hybrid event with meetings scheduled virtually over Zoom as well as in-person at the Capitol. Members who live in and around Sacramento will have the option to participate in person. Legislative offices are equally willing to meet virtually or in person, and the virtual option makes it easier for AAUW members around the state to participate.

Our AAUW California Legislative Advocate will schedule meetings with the legislative offices. The committee will assemble teams of AAUW members and college students, matching them with Assembly and Senate districts. Training materials on the bills and the event will be posted on the state website in mid-March, and a mandatory training webinar will be held on March 25, 2024.

Lobby Days is a wonderful opportunity to meet with your legislators and advocate for legislation to promote gender equity and improve the lives of women and girls. We hope that you will join us in this important activity to advance our values.

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Jennaca Hajek

2018 recipient of the AAUW Healdsburg Branch SRJC & 2019 Garren Scholarships

I graduated from Maria Carrillo High School in 2005 and have lived on my own since I was 18. I attended Santa Rosa Junior College for many years, while struggling to work full -time at a paint store and attending classes around my work schedule as best I could, making the overall process very slow. After taking an eye-opening break from school, I later returned as a re-entry student. At the time, I still was not sure what exactly I wanted to do but have always had a passion for the planet and the environment, and wanted a career dedicated to helping ecosystems thrive while encouraging humanity to live in a convenient and sustainable way. Working retail in a paint store was certainly not the way to do it, but starting a career in a completely different field when I was almost 30 was a very intimidating venture to say the least.



I eventually transferred from SRJC to Sonoma State University as a junior, majoring in biology. As I prepared for this, I knew that school must take priority, even if it meant taking out loans. It was then that I had the honor of being awarded the AAUW scholarship. Due to scheduling conflicts and the demands of being a full-time college student, I quit my job at the paint store and obtained a part-time job on campus that worked around my schedule and allowed me to work on my schoolwork during down time. While this minimum wage, part-time job was not even enough to pay rent, the AAUW scholarship provided a financial buffer during this time that made this transition much less stressful.

While attending SSU, I completed several amazing internships that allowed me to network, lead teams, and acquire hands-on experience in the field. I assisted PhD students at the UC Davis Bodega Marine Lab with their research on ocean acidification, kelp forest restoration, and the effects of climate change on estuary species. I worked as an intern for Point Blue Conservation Science on a project that uses satellite, AI, and bioacoustics analysis to advance the monitoring of biodiversity in the wilderness. I worked on vernal pool preserves and deep in California wilderness, while assisting SSU grad students with their research on threatened and endangered species, including the CA Tiger Salamander and CA Red-legged Frog. The renewal of the AAUW scholarship allowed me the flexibility to invest my time in these unpaid internships that provided me with experience I needed to obtain a job in my field. I was soon offered a part-time job with CA Department of Fish and Wildlife as a scientific aid where I collected biological data of marine species across the bay area. I completed my B.S. in Biology with a marine focus in May of 2020 during the height of the COVID-19 pandemic. I graduated Magna Cum Laude and was awarded "Graduation of Distinction" from the Biology Department!

Because of my passion for the research I was doing on threatened and endangered wildlife as an undergrad, I decided to join the Girman Lab at SSU as a graduate student majoring in conservation biology immediately after completing my B.S. There I continued my undergrad research on the federally threatened CA Red-legged Frog, to aid in the conservation of the species and other species that share its habitat. I finally completed my M.S in Biology in July of 2023! Grad school was the most difficult experience I have ever endured and finally finishing school at the age of 35 seems unreal at times. I now work as an environmental consultant and scientist at ERM (Environmental Resources Management) where I specialize in threatened and endangered species and other sensitive resources in the power sector for wildfire mitigation.

Throughout my time at SSU, my hardships were many including medical expenses, my car permanently breaking down, continually raising rent, decreased work hours due to the pandemic, as well as burdensome tuition and fees. Frankly, there were many times I felt like giving up, but your scholarships allowed me to stay in school and focus on my academic endeavors that would ultimately lead to a successful, exciting, and meaningful career! I sincerely thank the generous donors of AAUW. Without your help, none of this would have been possible.
