#### AAUW California Family,

This April, we will have the opportunity to practice the inclusion that we value by voting to welcome any person who is passionate about equity for women into AAUW, whether they have a degree or not.

AAUW National is proposing a bylaws amendment to eliminate the degree requirement for membership. On January 20th, the AAUW California Board of Directors unanimously approved a statement of support for the bylaws change.

We'd like to share our reasoning with you.

Our organization was founded in 1881 to advance opportunities for women and to work toward equal treatment with men. While the early members focused on increasing the number of women going to college, they also worked to make employment of women and children safer and began the fight for pay equity. As AAUW evolved to meet women's needs, the organization and its impact grew. Our focus expanded to include advocating for the needs of people of color and individuals/communities in poverty. The efforts of AAUW earned us permanent United Nations (U.N.) observer status which in turn led to AAUW members expanding the fight for civil rights and an overall deeper understanding and appreciation of those who are marginalized.

Throughout the past 143 years, AAUW members never stopped advocating for education while expanding our focus to ensuring policies around maternity leave, reproduction rights, equal pay, and policies against sexual harassment and violence against women. Welcoming those without a degree will not change who we are and what we are working towards- it will enhance our efforts by including anyone who is as passionate as we are about equity for women and girls. AAUW and its eligibility requirements have changed substantially over the years and yet, we still work together and strive to make women's lives better and we will continue to do so for years to come. Treating each other fairly and supporting one another with compassion is the foundation of AAUW and serves as the catalyst for current and future efforts. As we enter a time of uncertainty in our nation, we need to band together and continue to advocate for a better future.

We encourage you to practice the inclusion our founding members worked for and vote "yes"-watch for your ballot in April.

#### YOUR VOTE IS YOUR VOICE

Soon members will be asked to vote on a change to our bylaws recommended by the national AAUW Board of Directors and Governance Committee. The objective is to remove the degree requirement for membership, thereby opening eligibility to any individual who supports the AAUW mission and pays their annual dues.

Against removing the degree requirement:

AAUW is one of the leading advocates for women's rights in Washington DC. We are highly respected as an educated group of people. This is our brand. This is what differentiates us from the other organizations. We do not view this as elitist. Maybe some of us encountered several speed bumps and worked very hard to get our college degrees. We are proud of this. We are great examples for our young people who are questioning whether to go to college.

Membership in many nonprofit organizations is down across the US. AAUW National is struggling financially, and this is their attempt to get more members and more dues. This proposition has been on the ballot for the last 8 or so years and has been rejected each time. At one point, it was voted to accept AA degrees into our membership.

Why do they keep asking us? Please vote NO so we can retain our brand and our influence in Washington DC.

#### Speaker Series

April Speaker
Susannah (Sue) Labbe CEO
Healdsburg's Alliance Medical Center

The Alliance Medical Center is the only full service medical resource supporting low income, underinsured, and uninsured women as well as their families in northern Sonoma County.

Sue Labbe became the Alliance's CEO in 2022 after serving as the Center's Medical Director and Chief Medical Officer. Prior to joining the Alliance 2017, Sue assisted underserved populations for 15 years in the Central Valley.



The Alliance provides high quality, culturally sensitive medical care to more than 10,000 patients annually. Its Women's Health program offers preventive and obstetric care as well as education for girls and women on taking control of their own bodies, and reproductive options. Its Behavioral Health program supports women who have suffered trauma, societal repression and offers ways to make positive changes in their circumstances.

Founded in 1971 by community volunteers who saw a need to provide healthcare to farmworkers and their families, the Alliance (a Federally Qualified Health Center) operates three primary care clinics in Healdsburg and Windsor. Services are provided to anyone regardless of ability to pay and regardless of insurance/no insurance or Federal status. Their patients include hardworking agriculture, retail and hospitality workers and their families. A large percentage of their patients are uninsured because their employers do not offer health insurance or the insurance is not affordable.

In addition to her normal duties, Sue led the Alliance's critically important COVID-19 response, including working with numerous local community organizations, to equitably deliver over **38,000 doses of COVID** vaccines to community members, many of whom otherwise would not have had access to this potentially lifesaving resource.

Joining AAUW was influenced by her neighbor Mary Fitzgerald and also her desire to volunteer in the Reading Rocks program at Healdsburg Elementary School - "it's heaven." She's found Healdsburg to be a town where the ease, candor and friendliness of the people is an extra bonus.

Her favorite author Dorothy Canfield Fisher and book *Understood Betsy* is the story of a pale, city girl, with a math phobia, and bad dreams who's whisked away to rural Vermont. When picked up by her uncle at the train station he immediately hands her the reins of the horse. Betsy's transformation begins!

#### **Scholarship Success Story**

Samantha Moberly

2019 recipient of the AAUW Healdsburg Branch High School Scholarship

I am very grateful to have received an AAUW scholarship upon graduating from Windsor High School in 2019. Certainly, the financial assistance was a huge help, but more than that, the scholarship was a huge confidence boost to have an organization of successful individuals who believed in me and wanted to see me succeed. Throughout my life, I have been fortunate to have certain people, including those at AAUW, believe in me and encourage me forward, and this has cumulated in an inner confidence that I can do whatever I set my mind to.

After graduating, I went on to get my B.S. in mechanical engineering from Cal Poly, SLO. With the help of the scholarship, I was able to get away with mostly only working during the summers and having more time during the term to focus on my studies.

While pursuing this degree I decided to pick up an entrepreneurship minor, thinking the business and engineering combination would set me up to solve any problem. Through this minor, I found that my projects in several courses all converged on community. I spent several months interviewing different demographics to understand where the need was greatest and found a shocking lack of ways for recent college graduates to find friends. About 1/3 of recent grads each year leave strong college communities for (now often hybrid or remote) jobs in new cities, so it is not surprising that they are among those experiencing the highest rates of loneliness. Currently, the primary solutions for meeting people are apps. As a firm believer that real connection takes place in person, rather than digitally, I saw an opportunity to help people find what is considered the number one indicator of human happiness: positive relationships.

So, in what some would consider a shift from engineering (I always considered it a problem- solving degree) I decided to combat the problem. After graduating in June of 2023, I began working with Cal Poly's Center for Innovation and Entrepreneurship to build a startup called Social Spark. With the help of many fantastic mentors, we have been able to curate small- groups, extended social events that are proving effective at sparking new friendships. So far, we have had seven paid events across 5 different cities, for a total of 60 customers. We recruit and train group leaders, who act as event facilitators and connectors, and have received over 50 applications. The goal is to become the most trusted and effective company for helping people build lasting friendships, and we are excited to expand to more geographies and demographics.

Now an ME college graduate, a solo founder, and a female CEO, I have grown tremendously as a leader and person in the past few years, and so much of it I can attribute to the people I have had support me. When you grow up with people who encourage you that you can do anything, over time you believe it. As I am currently fundraising for my startup and bringing on investors, I can especially appreciate the bet that the AAUW members took on me so early. I am so excited to continue to learn and work hard, so that I can create an impact in this space that I am passionate about, and later hopefully create an impact like you all have for the next generation. Thank you all for investing in me and helping me grow over these last few years.
