Tech Trek 2024 came to a celebratory conclusion on Wednesday, September 11, with our Panel Discussion held at the Windsor Library. In attendance for our Tech Trek campers were 42 family members, branch members, teachers and our amazing donors. They all came to hear the girls talk about their experiences at Tech Trek on the Sonoma State campus this summer.



The panel discussion is an annual event that allows us the opportunity to hear firsthand stories about camp life and how they were impacted by the experience.

Our panel this year consisted of three campers, Maya G., Sophia V., and Susana L. Each excelled in speaking to the audience, sharing their joy and recognizing their growth as a result of attending camp.

Facilitating the discussion was Danielle Diaz, former teacher and newest Tech Trek Selection Committee Members along with four amazing Tech Trek Alumni Group (TTAG) girls: Joie K., president; Jessica V., secretary; Bryanna C., social media director; and Valeria E., event coordinator trainee. The students were asked questions such as: "What motivated you to apply for Tech Trek camp?" "How did you feel when you first arrived at the dorms vs when you left on the last day?" "Did your experience at Tech Trek impact your thoughts about STEM? If so, how? "Were there any benefits to interacting with girls at camp that were different from interacting with classmates and friends at school?" The answers were insightful, inspiring and entertaining.

Liz Loebel asked one of my favorite questions to the campers' parents, "Did you notice anything different about your child upon their return?" The parents responses included the increased confidence and personal growth they saw in their child, their gratitude for the branch selecting their child, and to thank the donors who made it possible.

This year, in full summer regalia, the TTAG Board donned paper leis and flashy sunglasses after decorating the Windsor Public Library meeting room with ocean shells, beach hats, flip flops, and brightly colored tableware. To warm up the group, activities began with a game of "What's My Name", where each



participant wore a tag on her back with the name of a well-known person or character. Without the ability to see the name on her tag, each girl had to move through the room asking other people yes/no questions



about this mystery person to discover who it was. The parents in attendance played, too. Lots of friendly chatter ensued before the names were guessed and then revealed to everyone. To reward all this hard work, ice cream was served, including a heavy dose of syrups, sprinkles and fresh fruit. The ice cream supplies were generously donated by Safeway in Healdsburg.

To give the girls an opportunity to work in problem-solving teams, they divided into two groups. An adapted version of Jeopardy was played, this time with a focus on the history and chemistry of ice cream. The TTAG board members


organized the questions and "hosted" the game. Competition was focused

Future events may include a collaborative activity with the San Francisco TTAG and hosting a booth at the North Bay Science Discovery Day.

Laura Anderson's Story
2019 recipient of the AAUW Healdsburg Branch High School
Scholarship

My name is Laura Anderson. When I graduated from Healdsburg High School in 2019, I made one of the best decisions of my life by choosing to attend California Polytechnic State University, San Luis Obispo. I majored in Animal Science and took minors in Dance and Dairy Industries. When I graduated in June 2023 with a Bachelor of Science degree, I was still a bit unsure of what my next steps might be and where my long-term passions really lay, but as you read on I think you'll agree that this has become more and more in focus.

While I began my journey at Cal Poly on a pre-veterinary track after about three years in, I discovered that this may not be my true passion. It took me a very long time to come to this realization, as I had been working towards becoming a veterinarian for most of my life, and I didn't want to let myself, and those around me, down. In the time I spent in college, I

learned so much about myself, the world, and opportunities I'd never dreamed of before. I discovered the hundreds of different career paths that were opening up to me with my animal science degree. As I greatly expanded my scope of the animal world, I've come to realized that there are so many species, besides our beloved dogs and cats, that are in need and under great stress.

Yes, I've discovered that my true passion lies with the exotic species of the world, more specifically, the endangered animals around the globe. We as humans have destroyed so many habitats and in turn, taken so many animals lives, to the point where their species is no longer viable. I want to make a difference in animal conservation and rehabilitation and try to reverse some of the damage we have done to hundreds of incredible animal species. I never would have been able to make this decision without the help of the AAUW and the scholarships they gave me. I was able to spend my time focusing on school and my future, without the stress of finances weighing on me.

Now, I have made a big move to San Diego, CA to pursue a career with exotic species, either at the San Diego Zoo, an aquarium, or somewhere similar. The San Diego Zoo Wildlife Alliance is an incredible organization that has projects across six continents to recover and rehabilitate endangered species. I cannot thank the AAUW committee enough for their impact on my college education, my career, and my future!

The picture provided above shows my time in Chiang Mai, Thailand in the summer of 2022, where I volunteered at Elephant Nature Park. This was an incredible opportunity where I got to learn about the elephants they rescued from various abusive industries. They have over 100 elephants that they have rescued, now living a long and happy life at the sanctuary! This experience solidified my love for exotic, endangered, or otherwise abused species and drove me towards my new career path.
