STEM

Over 400 years after Galileo's first glimpse of the stars through a telescope, the Healdsburg Tech Trek Alumni Group (TTAG) discovered the power of the Galileoscope to explore worlds beyond the reach of the naked eye. This compact refractor telescope, developed in 2009 for the International Year of Astronomy, was designed to ignite public interest in astronomy and the sciences.

On November 9, astrophysicist and AAUW Healdsburg member **Dr. Mary Barsony** led a hands-on workshop at the Cloverdale Library, where she guided TTAGers in assembling, disassembling, and focusing their Galileoscopes. Dr. Barsony enriched the experience with captivating facts and stories about astronomy—one of humanity's oldest sciences. For the past two years, she has led this workshop at Tech Trek, inspiring young students to embrace science and exploration.

TTAG is a student-led group of Tech Trek graduates dedicated to building connections with other like-minded girls, fostering shared interests in STEM, and developing leadership skills. With the support of AAUW advisors, all TTAG events are planned and led by the group's officers and event committee members, making each experience a true student-driven success.

AAUW AI Garren Scholarship Awards

Three Sonoma County women are the recipients of our 2024 Al Garren Scholarships in the amount of \$4,000 each. The awardees are Katherine Brashear, Darlene DuCharme, and Maria Navarro. Katherine Brashear is majoring in Psychology at Sonoma State University; Darlene DuCharme is majoring in Cinema and Broadcast Electronic Communication Arts at San Francisco State University; Maria Navarro is a Psychology major at UC Berkeley.



Healdsburg AAUW offers two types of scholarships for eligible Santa Rosa Junior College graduates who have been accepted at a four-year college or university. Our first scholarship, the Healdsburg AAUW Re-Entry Scholarship, is for the third year. Our second scholarship, the Healdsburg AAUW AI Garren Scholarship, is intended to help previous recipients of our Re-Entry awards with expenses in their fourth year. The AI Garren awards were made possible by the 2018 receipt of a \$250,000 donor-directed grant from the San Francisco Foundation's AI Garren Fund. The late Alper A. Garren was a brilliant, compassionate, and widely-loved Northern California particle physicist who gave generously of his time and resources to provide educational opportunities to promising students. With this year's three new grants, we will have helped twenty-five local women attain their educational goals.

Our recipients have overcome many challenges, often being the first in their families to attend college. Even with all the demands of being full-time students, our awardees have persevered in their challenging fields of study and look forward to making a positive impact on this world. Katherine Brashear wants to use her degree in psychology to pursue a career as a relationship coach or therapist to help others. Darlene DuCharme intends to use her degrees in cinema and broadcast communication arts to write, direct, shoot, produce and/or edit stories she believes need to be heard and to bring hope and inspiration to others. Maria Navarro wants to become an educator and obtain a Master's degree and teaching credential. She plans on using her background as an immigrant from a Spanish-speaking country to promote the benefits of bilingualism and the diversification of education.

Speaking on behalf of our committee, one of the bright spots of this year was to be able to award scholarships to such deserving women. Supporting our grantees who seek to improve their lives and careers through education is what we stand for as AAUW members. We are sure these women will enrich the lives of all they encounter as they move forward in their careers.

Our Scholarship Committee includes **Cathy Chiminello**, **Sue Finan**, **Charlene Luks**, and myself. I thank them for their good service to our organization and to the women whose lives and futures we seek to improve. Special thanks to AAUW member **Phil Wright** for all his help and thoughtful insights these past years as a member of both our Re-Entry Committee and Al Garren Committee.
