National Election of AAUW Officers Ballot Includes Endorsement of AAUW Public Policy Priorities

In April, all members received an email asking them to vote in our National AAUW election. If you haven't voted already, you still have time. The deadline to vote is May 13 at 5pm. Every other year, the national AAUW member-led Public Policy Committee, solicits member input on AAUW's Public Policy Priorities and puts forth recommendations to the AAUW Board of Directors on proposed changes. With this member-endorsed Public Policy Program as a guide, AAUW uses lobbying and grassroots efforts to push forward policies that break through educational and economic barriers for women. Below is a summary of proposed changes for 2025-2027:

- Specific endorsement of the 2024 Title IX regulations which provide increased support for student survivors of sexual harassment and assault and clarify Title IX protections for students who are LGBTQ+, pregnant, or parenting. Note that this language was updated after member comment to further clarify how support for comprehensive Title IX rules are articulated in light of the recent vacatur (set aside) of the 2024 Title IX rules.
- Clear articulation of support for inclusion of LGBTQ+ individuals in policies around school and workplace protections.
- Emphasis on specific components important for women's economic security including education, pay equity, caregiving burdens, retirement safety nets, and access to contraception and abortion.
- Enumeration of specific civil rights laws impacting education in addition to Title IX.
- Recognition that the Equal Rights Amendment has met the constitutional requirements for ratification as articulated in the U.S. Constitution.
- Removal of broad statements about poverty reduction, housing, health care for all, gun violence, immigration, and campaign finance reform.
- Clear articulation that AAUW's public policy focus is domestic.
- Inclusion of sex in addition to gender for consistency with AAUW's DEI Toolkit.

Understanding Ukraine's Economic, Political, Military, and Humanitarian Dimensions

Monday, May 12, 11:30 am - 1:30 pm

Ukraine is more than just a conflict zone. Our speakers will discuss Ukraine's deep economic ties to the U.S. and the world, its crucial position in the European political landscape, and the intertwined military and humanitarian challenges it faces during this ongoing crisis.

Betsy Hafner is a retired international trade attorney and a recently retired U.S. Deputy Assistant Trade Representative for Russia and Eurasia, where Russia and Ukraine were her main countries of responsibility. Betsy is also a member of our local AAUW chapter and AAUW volunteer high school Future Prep coordinator.

Michael Baker, MD is recently retired from a 40-year career in general, vascular, and trauma surgery. He also served 30 years in the uniform of his country and retired with the rank of Rear Admiral. He has

experience in operational medicine, combat deployment, medical intelligence, and strategic planning.



He teaches history, political science and military affairs for the Osher Lifelong Learning (OLLI) Programs at UC Berkeley, Dominican University, Cal State East Bay and is on the Board of Governors of Commonwealth Club World Affairs. He also teaches Advanced Trauma Life Support at military bases around the world and has gone on 5 medical training tours to Ukraine's war-torn regions. In 2023, he taught a well-received Healdsburg AAUW Forum course over Zoom on the <u>Use and Misuse of America's Military</u>.

TTAG Leaders Stepping Up

As a student-led organization, Tech Trek Alum Group (TTAG) is designed to build female leaders who are interested in pursuing careers in STEM fields. On March 30, the TTAG student board gathered to expand their leadership skills during a 6-hour workshop organized and presented by **Pam Jones**, former leadership development facilitator and current AAUW Board Secretary. Pam designed a rich curriculum of essential tools used by effective leaders in business, government and the non-profit work settings. These lucky TTAGers were engaged in a unique and intensive personal growth experience involving multiple leadership tools presented as interactive lessons within a TTAG context. During the workshop, the



girls honed their decision-making, planning, and inquiry skills as they filled flip chart pages with detailed objectives, measurable goals, and a full itinerary for an imaginary Mediterranean



vacation! By the end of the workshop, each girl was equipped with a "toolbox" of skills focused on decision-making, leadership style awareness, the power of assumptions, and organizational teamwork strategies. In the follow-up evaluation, the girls offered personal comments on the usefulness of these new skills in both a leadership role and in their daily lives. In their own words, here are some of the TTAG girls' insights following this special learning

experience:

"After the workshop, I feel like my definition of leadership has expanded. I think that it is much more complex than I had reflected upon and many layers that I had not considered."

"The seminar really reinforced what leadership means to me, especially when it comes to working as a team. She didn't just teach us how to collaborate—she (Pam) showed us what it truly means to lead. It's not about being bossy or just giving orders; it's about being the voice of your team, making sure everyone is heard, and guiding the group toward success together. It really made me reflect on the kind of leader I want to be."

"I want to keep building my leadership skills in every part of my life—whether it's during school projects, in my STEMinism club, on the field in sports, or even at home. Leadership isn't just about big moments; it's about the little everyday choices, like speaking up, supporting others, and staying committed. I know I



still have a lot to learn, but I'm excited to keep growing and challenging myself in new ways."

We send our gratitude to **Pam Jones** for pouring hours of work into preparing this powerful workshop for the TTAG Board and we thank her for presenting these life lessons with such professionalism and warmth. It was truly a labor of love!

Scholarship Success Stories

Dora Valenzuela's Story

2018 recipient of the AAUW Healdsburg Branch SRJC Scholarship

My name is Dora Ibarra Valenzuela, and I would like to express my gratitude towards the scholarship I was awarded by AAWU while I was in the nursing program at SRJC. The help and support I received really made the process of being a student less stressful. At the time, I was for the most part, a single mom of a lovely 3-year-old boy. At 28 years old and with a child, I was finally able to return to school and pursue my dream of being a college graduate. In fact, I would be the first in my family to accomplish this goal.

I came to the U.S when I was 5 years old and was not able to pursue my education after high school as I was an illegal resident and the dreamer's act was just being brought into existence. I took as many classes at SRJC as I possibly could before reaching a dead end. It was pointless for me to take any science/major courses as they expired, and I would not be able to apply to a

program and graduate as a nurse. When my legal status finally was settled, many years and a kid later, I returned to school and set my eye on my goal once again.

The struggle of being an older student returning to college and not having the same time to study as others for sure was difficult. I was working as much as I could, because I was financially responsible for supporting my son given his father did not agree that I return to school at the time. I had no support financially or even physically. I had to figure out how to study, work, and be a mom, all without giving up on something. Moments of despair made me question if I could handle all my roles. I picked up more classes, and more hours at work. I recorded all my lectures so I could study as I walked my son in his stroller to help him fall asleep. Once he finally fell asleep, I was able to cook, clean and do my house duties. I was told the time I "wasted" in school should be enough for me to pass my classes and not need to come home and study.



Those moments of stress really clouded my vision of accomplishing my goal. I didn't know financial aid was available and that scholarships were being

awarded. I was just taught to work hard and pay for my own needs. I was struggling, I needed a helping hand. I wanted so badly to just quit and accept that my dream was too hard for me to reach. I was so thankful when I was informed about the AAWU scholarship. I never thought I would be awarded a scholarship, but I thought it was worth a try. I am so thankful for the opportunity this scholarship gave me again. I was able to relax and focus on studying rather than focusing on how I would pay my bills. To all the people that donate to scholarships, I thank you. I graduated from SRJC with my associate's in nursing in May 2018. I fortunately was one of the very few who made it into the bridge program offered by Sonoma State University, and so a year after graduating nursing school, I also graduated from SSU with my bachelor's in nursing and in public health. I have been a registered nurse since 2018 and have worked as a correctional nurse, cardiac/stroke nurse, and survived the covid outbreak being so new in my career.

Thank you again for your support, I am now able to take care of those in need like you once took care of me.
