Future Prep and High School Career Events

Future Prep is AAUW's volunteer program at Healdsburg High School to help students explore career choices and understand the pathway, education, and life skills necessary to attain that career. **Betsy Hafner** is the chair of this committee. If you are interested in helping, please contact her. Aside from Future Prep, AAUW members are asked to participate in a number of classroom activities, ranging from offering feedback on students' community service activities and as observers in the presentation of junior class internship projects. We are also asked to help at the Financial Literacy event called Bite of Reality put on by the Redwood Credit Union for the juniors at Healdsburg High School. This event usually happens in late spring. A call for volunteers to help at all of these events will go out through Constant Contact.

Reading Rocks

Using teacher-provided materials, Reading Rocks is a program in which AAUW volunteers read one-on-one with first and second grade students to help these students improve their reading skills and build their confidence. Members volunteer at Healdsburg Elementary School where **Diane Burnley** is the committee chair and at Westside Elementary School where **Pat Bertapelle** is the committee chair. Last year the Reading Rocks Program started at Mattie Washburn in Windsor. More volunteers are needed at that school. 

Tech Trek 2025

With the help of generous donors, numerous volunteers, middle school teachers, the Tech Trek committee and countless others, AAUW Healdsburg was able to fund ten local middle school girls' participation in our week-long Tech Trek STEM camp.



This year our two locations were Camp Franklin at Sonoma State University and Camp Carson at UC Santa Cruz, each

hosting 80-100 rising 8th grade girls from across the state in residence halls and dining commons. Tech "Trekkers" participated in classes and workshops designed to further their interest in Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics as well as boost their confidence, their team-building skills and help them bond with other like-minded peers.

Of the ten campers chosen by our Tech Trek committee, six attended Camp Franklin. Each participated in a different core class such as "How to Catch a Criminal (Forensics)" and "Tremendous Trees (Botany)." Workshops included topics like robotics, math escape rooms and even self defense. **Mary Barsony** along with two former Tech Trek attendees and now TTAGers, **Susana L**. and **Rebecca P.**, taught an astronomy workshop. Campers also had the opportunity to test water of the Russian River while attending a field trip to the Sonoma Water Agency Education Center.

Camp Carson had a similar arrangement of core classes and workshops. The four students who attended this camp participated in workshops such as "Codebreaking" and "STEM in Aviation." Each camp had a Professional Women's Night in which campers heard from various women about their careers and experiences in STEM fields.

These camps were made possible with the assistance of many volunteers who served as dorm monitors, room monitors and workshop assistants. Campers eagerly experimented with the technology, learning how piezoelectricity can generate electricity in a fun, interactive way. In the process, TTAG showed the next generation that this innovative energy source isn't just science—it's a real-world tool for building a cleaner future.

If asked what advice she would share with young girls, she says: "Following dreams is important, but without hard work, discipline, and clear goals, they remain only dreams. No matter where you begin, it is possible to achieve what you want—if you're willing to put in the work."



Scholarship Success Stories: Joelle Canto Adams 's Story

2019 recipient of the AAUW Healdsburg Branch High School Scholarship

Back in 2019, as I was set to graduate from Windsor High School, I didn't know what I wanted to do when I "grow up," even though I was confidently applying to colleges to become a marine biologist. What I did know at the time was that I couldn't afford college on my own, and many student loan repayment programs could be predatory.

I was so lucky to be surrounded throughout most of my upbringing by smart, educated women who actively encouraged me to pursue learning and follow whatever paths sparked my passion, ultimately



leading me to university. They pushed me not to feel discouraged by obstacles—albeit a significant financial one—but to find a solution, something women have been doing for eons, recognized or not.

My solution was to apply to as many local, state, and national scholarships that I could find over my senior year. One such local scholarship was your Healdsburg AAUW branch, which was incredibly supportive and encouraging throughout the application and interview process.

You helped me focus on the opportunities ahead rather than the challenges I knew I would face—bringing levity and excitement to a potentially intimidating new chapter of my life.

News flash: marine biology didn't work out. Instead, along my college journey, I discovered botany! Much like our ancestors, I transitioned from sea to land, diving into botanical taxonomy and restoration science courses. Due to attending college during the pandemic, many of my field classes lacked the "field" part, so I had to seek hands-on experience elsewhere.

I landed a job with a campus-based restoration group, where I saw lessons on soil chemistry and interspecies competition come alive in the field. Thanks to support from my AAUW scholarship, I was able to save a portion of my salary while gaining meaningful, actionable experience for future jobs. That modest saving helped me build solid financial habits, which eventually enabled me to buy a car after college.

After graduating, I returned to the familiar routine of submitting applications—this time, for jobs. With a positive outlook, grounded in a phrase one of the wonderful women shared during my AAUW scholarship interview in 2019—and one I carry with me to this day—"that opportunities will arrive for those who search for them," I sent out application after application for months.

Well, one great opportunity did arrive: I became a field botanist in Northern California. I had to learn all the plants of this area—so different from, yet similar to, Southern California—and the challenge gave me a fresh reason to explore the Bay Area hiking trails.

Nowadays, you can find me on a boat inspecting mud banks for Mason's lilaeopsis or bushwhacking through the Sierras in search of a rare Lewisia (pictured). I'm grateful to have thrived in college and to be truly enjoying my early career.

I thank the Healdsburg AAUW for taking a chance on me and helping set me up for success. I implore you to continue your support and encouragement of young women and girls like me—especially at a time when both women and education face increasing challenges.
